"Talk to God. Listen. It doesn't have to big some big, formal thing."
"I don't know how to pray. I'm not sure I even believe in anything."

"Do it anyway."

(Dang it!)

Perhaps that early conversation with my sponsor foreshadowed similar internal dialogs when presented with opportunities for service in AA.

- ~ I'm too new myself to have anything useful to say to a Newcomer.
- ~ I've never made coffee in an urn that big.
- ~ I don't want to pick up a chip.
- ~ Chairing a meeting scares me.
- ~ Definitely not ready to sponsor.
- ~ I can't tell my story in front of a room full of people! What if I cry?

Lucky for us, Alcoholics Anonymous is a program of action. When my brain moves to jam me up with overthinking and negative Nellyness, I can remember my sponsor's matter of fact shrug and her suggestion to "do it anyway."

I recently heard a phrase in a meeting: "Think with your feet."

So I started with only a few days (then weeks) myself by saying hello to newcomers even more raw than I felt. Some of these have since become close friends; all have strengthened my sense of connection with a higher power present right here right now on earth in church basements all over the place. If you are new and wonder why everyone keeps giving you phone numbers, we have found a solution and are doing what works to keep us sober. Try it! It works!

A commitment to open the door and make the coffee at my home group one night a week came next. I reached milestones and showed up on birthday nights to share what has become possible for me through this program. I chair meetings, both online and in-person. I sponsor. I am here to be a sponsee for my sponsor. I tell my story (yes, sometimes I cry). As treasurer, I count the 7th tradition contributions, make deposits at the bank and issue payments for my home group's expenses.

My newest service commitment has been to agree to be the treasurer for the Gratitude Banquet coming up this fall. It seems like a big job and I feel nervous. Your participation just might help me rise to the challenge.

A.A. PAMPHLET OF THE MONTH: "Q & A on Sponsorship"

Central Office includes this pamphlet in their Newcomer Packet. What's your home group's approach to sponsorship?

How does sponsorship help a group?

The primary purpose of an A.A. group is to carry the message of the recovery program to alcoholics who want and ask for help. Group meetings are one way of doing this. Sponsorship is another.

In some groups, the idea of sponsorship is broadened to include working with alcoholics in nearby institutions and, through correspondence, with isolated Lone Members, Internationalists (seagoing A.A.s) and Homers.

Active sponsorship programs within a group remind all members of the group's primary purpose. They serve to unite a group, keep it mindful of First Things First.

What procedures can a group set up to sponsor new members?

Carefully planned sponsorship activity within a group is often likely to produce better results than sponsorship left to chance.

A typical pattern of planned sponsorship within a local group might include the following:

- A regular committee on sponsorship or a Twelfth Step committee, with members rotating frequently. If there is an intergroup or central office that keeps a list of local groups and the members available for Twelfth Step calls, such a committee may check to see whether the group has enough of its members on the office list to fulfill its responsibility.
- Regular beginners meetings (also called newcomers meetings) particularly in larger communities where there are many newcomers. A Guide for Leading Beginners Meetings may be ordered from G.S.O.
- Regular assignment of members to greet newcomers at meetings and introduce them around. In large groups, people on a hospitality committee may wear badges for the benefit of the newcomer. In smaller groups, the secretary may, during the announcements, simply ask newcomers to come up and make themselves known after the meeting, so they may be introduced to other members.
- Another suggested announcement. "If any person here does not have a sponsor and wants one, please see the secretary, who will arrange a temporary sponsor." Where this practice is followed at each meeting, members say, it reminds the group of the value of sponsoring and being sponsored.
- Closed-meeting discussions of sponsorship problems and opportunities. Some groups schedule meetings especially for this purpose.
- Table display of Conference-approved A.A. literature on recovery (including this pamphlet).
- Study of Chapter 7 in the Big Book ("Working With Others").
- Regular procedure (carried out by the secretary or the sponsorship committee) for welcoming newcomers who have just left institutions, treatment centers, or halfway houses. For instance, the secretary may receive word from the secretary of a prison group that a newly released person is about to attend a meeting, and the "outside" group is then alerted to the arrival of this newcomer.







Frequently Asked Questions About the 2025 International Convention & Travel to Canada Updated July 12, 2022

1. When and where will the 2025 International Convention take place?

The 90th anniversary of Alcoholics Anonymous will be celebrated at the 2025 International Convention in Vancouver, BC, Canada, July 3 – 6, 2025.

2. What is the theme of the 2025 International Convention?

The theme of the 2025 International Convention is "90 Years – Language of the Heart."

3. Have A.A. International Conventions been held in Canada before?

Yes. There have been International Conventions in Toronto (1965), Montreal (1985), and Toronto (2005). As you may know, the Responsibility Statement was adopted at the 1965 International Convention in Toronto.

4. Are there any restrictions or regulations affecting travel to Canada in 2025?

Yes. The U.S. and Canada each have restrictions and regulations that apply to citizens and visitors who travel from one country to the other. Border crossing into Canada has significantly changed, particularly in the last two years. (For more information: access links to Canada Border Services Agency website (CBSA) provided below question #6)

5. Who will have to process forms and applications to gain admission to Canada?

It is suggested that those who believe they have some past legal incident, such as a DUI or felony that could inhibit their attendance at the 2025 International Convention, seek assistance/information by accessing the CBSA links provided below question #6.

6. What Canadian travel information is currently available?

The International Convention assignment at G.S.O. is not yet up-and-running. However, below is a resource to aid members in making plans to attend the 2025 International Convention (most questions can be answered by connecting to the links below). Also, a good travel book on Canada will provide valuable information on needed documents and border crossing requirements, as well as vacation tips.

7. When will registration and hotel information be available?

General registration and housing information will be available on the International Convention webpage in early 2024. Actual registration site links, forms, and hotel booking links will be communicated to the Fellowship in August/September 2024.

8. If travel to Canada is difficult for some U.S. members, why are we holding an International Convention in Vancouver?

The Fellowship of the United States and Canada makes up the General Service Structure of Alcoholics Anonymous in North America, and functions as one entity in spirit and in service to the Fellowship. As this event rotates through the regions of A.A., there will be times when it takes place in the U.S., and other times when it is held in Canada.

Laws and other circumstances may impede some members from traveling from one country to the other. For instance, some Canadians could not attend the 2000 International Convention in Minneapolis because of the difference in value of the Canadian dollar and U.S. dollar. Rotation of International Conventions provides accessibility for all members. The Metro Vancouver Convention & Visitors Bureau has assured A.A. that Canada will do whatever is possible to welcome and cooperate with members for the 2025 International Convention in Vancouver.





Update on printing delays and backorders due to supply chain disruptions

August 22, 2022

Dear A.A. Friends,

As we have been updating everyone throughout these unprecedented times, supply chain disruptions throughout the worldwide paper, printing and trucking industries continue to unfavorably impact the manufacture and distribution of A.A.W.S. literature and other items.

Since 2020 we have implemented many measures in efforts to reduce potential backorders — for example, ordering paper and scheduling reprints with our printers of the Big Book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*, and other items more than six months in advance of projected need.

The good news: Demand for the Big Book, *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, and other items of literature has rebounded from the early days of the Covid-19 pandemic — as folks are returning to in-person meetings.

The not-good news: We are currently low in stock of the English hardcover Big Book (Item B-1) and unable to reprint expeditiously. This is due to a serious supply-chain matter beyond our control regarding a disruption in the necessary paper delivery at our printing plant.

Taking action

We are in communication daily with our printers, and I personally have reached out to their leadership to emphasize how important this book is in carrying A.A.'s message to our Fellowship and beyond.

Mixed-Title pilot test discounts will be honored

Note: Our current "Mixed Title" discount will be honored for all orders of backordered items placed by September 30, 2022. Items will be shipped when available.

What we are doing to actively address current and potential intermittent backorders

Our teams across many departments in the office have been working to address these challenges, placing orders for paper and binding supplies nine months in advance, and scheduling press time well in advance for reprints to help reduce backorders caused by these disruptions.

Projected continued out-of-stock periods

It is likely, however, that we will be experiencing intermittent disruptions for the foreseeable future, as all publishers will, based on industry-wide reporting. We will keep everyone informed.

Webstore and Member Services

Our Member Services and A.A.W.S. webstore teams have implemented measures to insure the following:

- 1) Those seeking to purchase items will receive all discounts earned on items that they select – including those items on backorder.
- 2) Individuals ordering can "add to cart" and place orders for these items as they normally would. The items will ship when they are back in stock.
- 3) Purchasers will receive emails informing them of any backorders.
- 4) The product detail pages of the webstore will state when an item is "out of stock," provide an estimated "back in stock" date, and display related items available for purchase now (the same content in different formats, for example).
- 5) A notice on the detail pages for out-of-stock items will reiterate that purchasers seeking to order our literature may check with their local Intergroups and Central Offices, which may have the items in stock.

As always, we encourage ordering the Big Book and all of our items of literature from local groups, Intergroups and Central Offices, as they play a vital role in funding local Twelfth Step activities.

Working together, we are committed to A.A.'s time-honored tradition of collaboration and resilience within the Fellowship as we carry the message via our literature. With all best A.A. wishes.
